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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ambedkar college of arts and science college established in 2014, Ambedkar college of Arts and science is a premier educational institute located in Wandoor, Kerala. It is aided by Govt. of Kerala and affiliated to University of Calicut. It offers four UG courses and one PG course.

The Institute enjoys a good reputation for courses like MA (Development Economics) BA (English & Economics) BSc (Mathematics) and B com (co-operation). Over the years Ambedkar college of Arts and science has gained expertise through its experienced language faculties, Malayalam and Arabic. The college provides facilities all around the campus including Library, Computer Lab, Cafeteria and large Playground.

The college is run by the INDIRAJI MEMORIAL SOCIETY, a Society formed with the aim of uplifting the lot of the depressed classes in general and Scheduled Caste population in particular. The college is unique in the sense that it is the first such institution ever.

To educate youngsters from downtrodden and minority communities enabling them to lead sustainable life by preserving traditional values and to meet global challenges.

Mission

To uncover hidden talents and provide students with opportunities to reach their full potential, thereby shaping the future leaders of the country.

To engage youth in developing their intellectual abilities while instilling core values, thereby equipping them for lifelong opportunities to contribute meaningfully to society.

To provide equal opportunities for quality education, while equipping students with knowledge and skills in their chosen stream.

To generate entrepreneurs and global leaders with human values for sustainable growth of the nation.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

This is the first college in Kerala run by a trust of philanthropists and retired officers from socially backward community and to serve for the Scheduled Caste people in particular.

The institution demonstrates a strong commitment to social responsibility and community development through

its unique vision and mission focused on uplifting downtrodden and minority communities.

The student population completely demographic representation of the region as many students from marginalized communities are taking admission to pursue their higher studies.

There is a special community outreach program targeting tribal communities also located in a rural area, the college provides access to its target population.

The campus is set in calm and tranquil natural surroundings, ideal for academic and creative activities.

The faculty comprises both young and experienced members, with expertise in cultural sensitivity and social work.

The administrative system is responsive and effective in managing change as it is well supported by a highly flexible and adaptive management team and strong, efficient Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) is actively involved in the institution.

The college adopts a holistic approach to education, combining traditional values with modern skills.

Classrooms are ICT-enabled, and there is a well-equipped seminar hall with ample digital resources in library to access N-List and INFLIBNET, DELNET and many such online resources.

There is an open reading area, open classroom, and browsing area to enhance the teaching and learning process leads to excellent academic results.

The institution ensures to reach out Central and state government scholarships are available for students achieving above 90%.

Field visits, institutional visits, and residential camps are conducted to foster a holistic learning experience.

College NSS students and teachers are much interested and fully involved in maintaining serene and green cover of the campus which resulted in eco-friendly campus with zero plastics usage and complete ban on toxic materials.

Programs like NSS, Student Palliative Initiative, Bhoomithra Sena, and Nature Club instill humanitarian and environmental values in students.

The ED-Club and Innovation Club promote entrepreneurship and encourage creativity and innovation.

A Yoga Center and Fitness Club are available for physical and mental health.

The SC/ST Development and Grievance Redressal Cell addresses caste-based discrimination, harassment, and violence.

The Women Development and Grievance Redressal Cell promotes gender equality, women's empowerment, and a safe, inclusive environment.

Institutional Weakness

The institution established recently with limited financial resources, research funding is being one of the most important hurdles to cross with for teachers and students to pursue further on sparkling new ideas.

The institution is in completely rural area, the lack of connect to industrial hubs restricts for new technology related training and placements and access to innovative learning processes there are limitations in fund mobilization for research.

Restrictions on academic flexibility due to university affiliation system to start new degree programs Artificial Intelligence and Machine learning, Food Science to cope with emerging markets.

Being an Aided institution more dependence on limited government grants and funding for development activities like new Computers and related laboratories, very limited opportunities for alumni fundraising.

Limited national and international exposure to students and faculty members on research activities and Inadequate hostel facilities for students, dropout rates among female students due to marriage and pregnancy.

Institutional Opportunity

Growing demand for education among rural, backward communities exploring Collaboration with local businesses for job training and placement.

The college has a bright future as an institution for the educational upliftment of backward communities.

Plans to expand offerings of NPTEL courses and other online learning platforms, enabling students to access a wider range of courses from reputed institutions like IITs and foreign universities.

Intends to launch innovative, industry-relevant, and interdisciplinary post-graduate programs.

Aims to enhance funding for research projects, infrastructure development, and faculty enrichment

Plans to introduce new and innovative science programs in emerging areas such as Data Science, Artificial Intelligence, Space Science, etc.

Establishing more collaborations with leading research organizations and industries with Plans to integrate internship programs as a mandatory component of the curriculum.

Expanding the number of MoUs with national and international institutions to foster global academic exchanges is a priority.

Construction of new hostels to accommodate students from different regions, with the aim of providing quality residential facilities.

Institutional Challenge

Increased administrative and clerical workloads imposed on faculty members negatively affects curriculum delivery and professional development.

Loss of working days due to natural calamities and viral outbreaks is a major concern for students and faculty for the health and well-being.

The majority of students enrolling in programs at the college come from socially and economically disadvantaged sections, which poses a challenge for introducing ambitious programs.

The inability to afford personalized learning gadgets hinders digital learning.

Being an affiliated college, the institution is more with Regulatory challenges from UGC, University and AICTE for regular and accreditation requirements for institutions.

Competition from established institutions and online education providers, Limited job opportunities and career advancement for graduates.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Ambedkar College of Arts and Science, Wandoor, affiliated with the University of Calicut, offers 4 UG and 1 PG programme, following a curriculum set by the university. The **College Council**, **IQAC**, and departmental committees oversee curriculum implementation and academic and non-academic matters. The college follows a **Choice Based Credit Semester System**, allowing students to choose elective courses. Programmes like **ASAP**, **Walk with a Scholar**, and **Scholar Support Programme** offer additional skill development opportunities.

A digital library supports academics with resources like INFLIBNET and NDLI. Faculty members contribute to curriculum development, and action plans are created annually for smooth curriculum delivery. Students are encouraged to pursue online courses from platforms like Coursera, SWAYAM-NPTEL, and MOOCs. The Grievance Redressal Cell handles curriculum-related complaints.

The college uses innovative teaching methods, including **ICT-enabled classrooms** and online platforms. An **induction programme** and **bridge courses** help new students adapt. Final-year students undertake mandatory projects for experiential learning. **Feedback on syllabus** is collected from stakeholders and analyzed for improvements. Internal evaluation is continuous, with **PTA meetings** held each semester to review student performance.

The institution integrates crosscutting issues of **Professional Ethics**, **Gender**, **Human Values**, and **Environmental Sustainability** through both curriculum and co-curricular activities. Programmes like **BCom**, **BA Economics**, **MA Economics**, and others include courses that address these issues, and **audit courses** like

Environment Studies, Human Rights, and Gender Studies further sensitize students.

- Professional Ethics & Human Values: A Code of Conduct is enforced, monitored by the Ethics and Discipline Committee. Initiatives like blood donation camps, AIDS Day observance, and community outreach programs promote human values.
- Gender: The college offers gender-related courses and organizes events such as self-defense training, pre-marital counseling, and seminars on LGBTQ issues. The Women Development Cell promotes women's education and career development.
- Environmental Sustainability: Sustainability is emphasized through the curriculum and activities like campus cleaning, nature camps, and celebrating environment-related days. Energy conservation and waste management training are implemented to raise environmental awareness.

The college integrates academic, ethical, and social responsibility into its core mission through a blend of academic courses, events, and community initiatives.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution adheres to the norms and guidelines of the Government of Kerala and follows the Centralized Admission Process of the University of Calicut, ensuring transparency and a student-friendly approach. It ensures an inclusive admission procedure and policy, with a special focus on uplifting socially and educationally backward sections, including the Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe communities.

The average student enrolment percentage over the last five years is 89.51%. The percentage of seats filled against reserved categories, in accordance with the applicable reservation policy for first-year admissions over the last five years, is 98.89%. The full-time teacher-to-student ratio for the current year is 1:24.88. Additionally, 100% of full-time teaching posts have been filled in line with sanctioned posts over the last five years.

Holistic education is promoted through various teaching-learning techniques, both inside and outside the classroom, including experiential learning, participative learning, problem-solving methodologies, and ICT-enabled sessions. The institution provides advanced facilities such as ICT-enabled classrooms, laboratories, and a resource center, creating an environment conducive to effective teaching and learning. A blend of student-centric and participative teaching-learning techniques is used to foster interactive and effective classroom experiences.

A significant 89.68% of the teachers are qualified with a Ph.D. or National Eligibility Test (NET). The institution also implements a transparent and efficient continuous evaluation mechanism at the department and college levels. A three-tier grievance resolution system for assessment-related issues ensures transparency and efficiency in the Grievance Redressal process.

The communication of Course Outcomes (COs) and Program Outcomes (POs) is made transparent through the college website, and orientation programs are organized on campus to convey COs and POs to students at the beginning of their graduation programs. Both direct and indirect methods—such as Continuous Internal Assessment, including seminar presentations, assignments, internal tests, classroom participation, viva voce, project work, and end-semester examinations—are used to assess the attainment level of Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

The average student pass percentage over the last five years is 88.69%. The database of current students is also collected and utilized for the Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS).

Research, Innovations and Extension

Over the past five years, the college has engaged in numerous extension activities that have positively impacted students and the local community. Key initiatives include blood donation camps, eye care camps, flood relief efforts, kitchen garden promotions, and community cleaning drives. The college's NSS unit has been active in flood-affected areas, contributing to relief camps and cleaning efforts. Other notable programs include "Ini Njan Ozhukatte" (rivulet cleaning), the "Green Clean Earth" seedling conservation program, and various community support initiatives such as "Orithiri Thanal" (house construction fundraising) and "Sneharamam" (community engagement). The college also partnered with local organizations to conduct day-care programs, educational support for women, and mass cleaning programs in nature-sensitive areas.

The institution has received several awards and recognitions for its extension activities. These include student achievements in quiz competitions, elocution contests, taekwondo championships, and entrepreneurship awards. These recognitions highlight the college's commitment to student growth and community service.

Additionally, the institution has developed a robust innovation ecosystem, focusing on entrepreneurship, intellectual property rights (IPR), and traditional Indian knowledge systems. The college has established an IPR Cell, an ED club, and programs like the Young Innovators Program (YIP) to support student-led innovation and entrepreneurship. The ED Club promotes entrepreneurial skills through workshops and mentorship, while Indian knowledge systems like yoga and cultural heritage preservation play a key role in holistic development. The college's Film Club also provides students with practical journalism experience.

This approach to extension activities and innovation helps foster a well-rounded, socially conscious, and entrepreneurial student body, reflecting the institution's commitment to societal development and cultural preservation.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Ambedkar College of Arts and Science, Wandoor, is located in a rural area covering 5 acres with a built-up area of 4688.17 sq. m. The campus is easily accessible via the Valancherry-Nilambur state highway and is surrounded by greenery. The college infrastructure includes 14 classrooms, a computer lab, a seminar hall, and a well-equipped library. Since its inception in 2014-2015, the college has expanded its academic programs and facilities, offering five undergraduate and one postgraduate program. The campus has 46 computers for students and ICT-enabled classrooms equipped with projectors, ensuring a conducive learning environment.

The library is a key academic resource, offering over 4,869 books, including 800 reference titles, and subscribing to 43 journals. It provides access to extensive digital resources through INFLIBNET, DELNET, NLIST, and the National Digital Library of India (NDLI). The library is equipped with a reprographic center, digital entry-exit system, and advanced library management software (KOHA). The Reader's Club organizes various literary and research-focused activities.

The college supports sports and cultural activities with facilities like an open auditorium, seminar hall, outdoor courts, a yoga center, and a 200-meter track. The campus also offers amenities such as toilets for boys, girls, and differently-abled individuals, a girls' restroom, drinking water, and uninterrupted power via a solar power plant, generator, and UPS. A digital display board and public address system are used for communication.

IT infrastructure is continuously upgraded, with three high-speed internet connections, including a 200 Mbps RAILWARE and a 100 Mbps K-FONE connection. All departments and offices are connected through LAN and Wi-Fi. ICT-enabled classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors, and administrative processes are fully integrated with IT systems, ensuring efficiency and transparency. The college uses the Embase Pro-suite for automation, and a server supports the digitalization of administrative functions. CCTV cameras ensure campus security, and the resource center provides internet browsing, printing, and photocopying services.

Student Support and Progression

The Ambedkar College of Arts & Science Alumni Association (ACASAA) is a registered organization established under the Societies Registration Act of 1980, with the aim of fostering a supportive network among alumni and contributing to the development of the institution. Key contributions of ACASAA include:

- 1. **Financial and Material Support**: The association has donated 12 laptops for the computer lab and library, enhancing students' access to technology. Additionally, the English Alumni contributed a 42-inch LED TV for educational purposes, enriching the learning experience through presentations and screenings.
- Organizing Alumni Meetups: ACASAA hosts numerous alumni meetups, which serve as networking
 opportunities and mentorship platforms. These gatherings help alumni reconnect and provide guidance
 to current students regarding career pathways and challenges.
- 3. **Recreational Activities**: Recognizing the importance of camaraderie, ACASAA organized a memorable trip to Ooty, allowing alumni to bond and share experiences in a fun environment.
- 4. **Conducting Iftar Meets**: To promote inclusivity and cultural awareness, ACASAA has organized Iftar meets during Ramadan, allowing alumni from diverse backgrounds to come together, break their fast, and foster unity.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Ambedkar College of Arts and Science, located in Wandoor, Malappuram District, operates under the Indiraji Memorial Trust, registered under the Indian Trust Act. Led by Manager Bhaskaran P, the institution is known for fostering an inclusive and innovative educational environment that supports the overall development of both students and staff. The college focuses on providing accessible higher education, especially to underserved communities, including SC, ST, and OBC populations in the rural region of Wandoor.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a pivotal role in implementing the college's strategic plan, which aims for continuous improvement in academic and administrative domains. Since its formation, IQAC leadership has passed through dedicated faculty members, with Dr. A S Sanil currently leading the department. feedback mechanisms are employed to identify areas for improvement and ensure transparency.

It incorporates the Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) in its undergraduate and postgraduate programs. As per university guidelines, elective and open courses are mandatory. While selecting elective courses, the college prioritizes the relevance of the course and the needs of the institution. Similarly, an interdisciplinary approach is considered when selecting open courses. All students are required to complete a mandatory project for the successful completion of their program. The college integrates community service, environmental education, and value-based education into its academic framework to foster holistic development through the activities of various departments, clubs, and associations. Additionally, the college organizes seminars, workshops, and invited lectures that incorporate both interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approaches. It has broadened its efforts by offering certificate courses and enrolling students in online MOOC programs. From this academic year onwards, the institution is committed to implementing the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP), as envisioned by the NEP 2020.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

As a college affiliated with the University of Calicut, Ambedkar College of Arts & Science, Wandoor, is committed to adapting to the National Education Policy (2020) by integrating aspects of the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) framework. Although the implementation of the ABC system depends on the university's directives, we recognize its role in fostering a flexible, credit-based education. Since the institution is an affiliated undergraduate college, it does not qualify for registration with the Academic Bank of Credit. Nevertheless, students are encouraged to participate in online MOOC programs such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, Coursera, and others.

3. Skill development:

The college conducts a wide range of programs

dedicated to fostering the skill enhancement of its students. Various departments offer certificate and skill development courses aimed at improving communication skills, life skills, and soft skills. These courses cover diverse areas such as communication skills, public speaking, and employability skills. In addition to certificate courses, government initiatives implemented at the college, such as the Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP), Walk with a Scholar (WWS), and the Scholar Support Programme (SSP), further help develop employability, communication, and soft skills. The Career and Placement Cell frequently conducts workshops on employability skills and organizes placement drives for students. We have also partnered with Cambridge English to offer English language training courses to enhance communication skills. Furthermore, our association with the Kerala Knowledge Economy Mission's "Connect Career to Campus" program reinforces our commitment to preparing students for employment through various skill-enhancing initiatives. Additionally, the college emphasizes skill development through programs such as day observations, awareness campaigns, and activities organized by various clubs, associations, and departments.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The institution integrates traditional Indian Knowledge System into modern educational approaches to preserve and revitalize traditional knowledge. The Indian knowledge system is largely incorporated into the curriculum of the under graduate and post graduate programmes to inculcate an awareness of the Indian traditional philosophies, values and civilization and to apply these traditional knowledge in real world contexts. The courses in the curriculum encourage students to critically analyse traditional knowledge and its relevance in the modern world. It is intended to provide a holistic learning experience that reflects the diversity and heritage of our country. To achieve this end various learning strategies such as discussions, debates, field visits, observance of nationally important days are adopted by the college. Indian mythology, folk lore and traditions are used as tools to convey moral lessons and cultural heritage of India. Students perform in various traditional art form competitions like folk

songs and folk dance in various programmes at the institutional and university level. By studying Malayalam, and Arabic as second language the students learn about the contribution of these languages to the cultural and historical tapestry of India. The faculties of the college have attended short term courses on Indian Knowledge System and have gained deep insights about the role of traditional Indian knowledge to enhance curriculum and teaching methods. As part of its commitment to preserving and promoting the essence of Indian culture, the institution facilitates numerous initiatives. These include the celebration of traditional cultural festivals like Onam and Vishu, which provide a platform for students to immerse themselves in the richness of our cultural heritage. Also, the college observes Keralappiravi (November 1) annually, underscoring the importance of linguistic diversity and encouraging the preservation of various languages. To foster a sense of unity and understanding among students from diverse backgrounds, the College actively promotes cultural values through various means. The institution facilitates the organization and celebration of cultural events and festivals that represent different regions and religions, including Onam, Christmas, and Eid. These festivities serve as platforms for students to share and experience distinctive cultural traditions, thereby fostering a conducive environment for cultural exchange. Additionally, the college organizes competitions, such as flower carpets, group songs, Mehandi, to encourage positive interactions among students and further reinforce the importance of cultural values. Under the auspices of the Department of Arabic Department of English and Department of Malayalam, the college observes "Reading week Celebration" with various programmes. . The fine arts club conducts regular programmes that would promote different cultural traditions of India.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Response:

Ambedkar College of Arts and Science, Wandoor, affiliated with the University of Calicut, offers 4 UG and 1 PG programmes, following a curriculum designed by the university. The College Council, IQAC, and departmental committees oversee curriculum implementation and academic and non-academic matters. They conduct meetings, draft action plans, allocate teaching portions, and monitor processes to ensure effective curriculum delivery.

The college follows the Choice Based Credit Semester System, allowing UG and PG students to select elective courses and an open course from other departments. Students are encouraged to participate in Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP), Walk with a Scholar (WWS), Scholar Support Programme (SSP), and various certificate, skill development, and add-on courses.

A well-equipped digital library supports the academic environment with an extensive collection of books, internet access, and resources like INFLIBNET, N-list, e-Shodhsindhu, and NDLI. Faculty members also contribute to curriculum development and evaluation as board members and research guides.

The academic calendar is aligned with the university's schedule, with departmental and college calendars prepared annually. Each department drafts action plans for curricular and co-curricular activities, which are approved by the College Council. The college's calendar, distributed at the start of each academic year, includes all academic activities and serves as a guide for students and teachers.

Students receive guidance to pursue online courses via platforms like Coursera, SWAYAM-NPTEL, and MOOC. A Grievance Redressal Cell addresses complaints related to curriculum delivery and internal marks. A master timetable and departmental schedules ensure effective curriculum delivery.

Course and program outcomes are available on the college website, and a Teacher's Companion from the IQAC aids in systematic syllabus delivery. Innovative teaching methods, including ICT-enabled classrooms and online platforms, are employed. Departments also host seminars to expose students to current trends and facilitate participation in discussions.

An induction programme and bridge courses are conducted for new students to familiarize them with the course structure and bridge educational gaps. Final-year students complete a mandatory project for experiential learning.

Feedback on syllabus design and review is collected from students, teachers, alumni, and employers through structured forms. This feedback is analyzed, and actions are taken as needed, with reports posted on the college website. Continuous evaluation through internal marks based on exams, attendance, assignments, and seminars is managed by the internal examination board, which also oversees the collection, evaluation, and result declaration.

PTA meetings are held each semester to review student performance. Various clubs and organizations support both academic and non-academic needs, and the college conducts activities addressing cross-cutting issues such as professional ethics, gender, human values, and environmental sustainability.

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institution has an effective system for conducting both internal and external examinations, structured in alignment with the university's academic calendar. The internal assessment system is overseen by the Internal Assessment Cell and department-level examination committees, ensuring timely and efficient evaluations. The academic calendar outlines schedules for internal assessments, model exams, and tentative dates for university examinations. Teachers are informed of the assessment plan through staff meetings, ensuring smooth execution of internal assessments, which include exams, assignments, attendance monitoring, and seminars.

Internal examinations are carried out following university guidelines, covering exam notifications, scheduling, invigilation, and seating arrangements. Question papers are designed to meet course outcomes and university standards, and seating is arranged by roll number. Examination halls are strictly monitored through CCTV surveillance to maintain the integrity of the assessment system. Attendance is carefully tracked, and provisions for retests are available for eligible students. Answer scripts are returned within a week, and students can seek clarification on marks. Internal assessment marks are displayed on notice boards and communicated to parents via SMS or post, with retests offered to students who miss exams for valid reasons.

Transparency is a key feature of the institution's internal assessment system. Attendance, internal test marks, and other relevant documents are published monthly and shared with students, parents, and faculty through PTA WhatsApp groups. The academic performance and attendance of each student are meticulously recorded and accessible to all relevant stakeholders. Post-examination meetings with parents, announced via WhatsApp groups, encourage open communication, enhancing the assessment process and student outcomes.

The institution emphasizes fairness through a well-structured grievance redress mechanism that allows students to address concerns regarding internal assessments and university results. The internal assessment system includes the publication of key documents like Form 15 and Form 16, ensuring transparency. Reports from both internal and external examiners are reviewed to refine the assessment process.

Direct assessments include midterm and end-semester examinations, while lab courses align practical sessions with one or more POs to measure the knowledge, skills, and values students should acquire. The outcomes of each course are evaluated based on internal assessments, which contribute 20% of the overall grade, and external examinations, which account for 80%. Additionally, end-of-course surveys serve as an indirect assessment tool, offering further insight into students' learning experiences.

Each course is mapped to specific POs, and this mapping ensures that course evaluations reflect broader program goals. The results of PO assessments are compared to predetermined attainment levels to ensure the educational objectives are being met. A PO is considered satisfied when these expected levels are reached, fostering transparency and providing clear expectations for students. This systematic approach supports continuous improvement in curriculum delivery and aligns with professional standards.

Monitoring CO and PO attainment is the responsibility of the Academic Monitoring Committee, which conducts both internal and external evaluations. Internal evaluations involve a variety of metrics such as classroom participation, assignments, seminars, tests, vivas, and projects. Summative evaluations take place at the end of each semester to assess overall student performance and ensure alignment with the course and program outcomes.

To enhance this process, department-wise result analyses are conducted to identify areas for improvement, contributing to the overall enhancement of the learning environment. Additionally, regular Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) meetings are held to communicate students' academic and non-academic progress, fostering collaboration between faculty, students, and parents to support student success.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Outcomes of Extension activities in the neighborhood community in terms of impact and sensitizing the students to social issues for their holistic development during the last five years.

Response:

The college's extension activities aim to foster student social participation, benefiting the broader community and promoting humanitarian values. Various clubs and forums, including the Women Development Cell (WDC), Entrepreneurial Development (ED) Club, Bhoomitra Sena, and academic departments, actively engage in these initiatives. Both students and the local community, especially in Wandoor, Chokkad, and Thuvvur Grama Panchayats, benefit from these programs.

Educational Support

The Mathematics Department and Club launched 'Kanakkanu Karyam' on September 18, 2023, to support children from Chinkakallu Prakruthi in Chokkad Village. Additionally, Nature Club members joined the Nadukani Mass Cleaning drive organized by Friends of Nature.

Blood Donation

On July 17, 2019, Wandoor Blood Donors WhatsApp group, Wandoor Trauma Care Unit, and NIMS Hospital organized a blood donation camp with Manjeri Blood Bank. 62 NSS volunteers attended an awareness class, and 15 students donated blood. Another blood donation camp was held by NSS-232 at Ambedkar College in collaboration with Government Medical College, Manjeri.

Eye Care Camp

In collaboration with Netra Hospital, the NSS unit held an eye care camp on October 31, 2019, with 41 students participating.

Flood Relief and Cleaning

NSS volunteers cleaned flood-affected homes in Edavanna, Mundengara, and Nilambur from August 11-14, 2019. They also worked with other college NSS units to clean businesses in Nilambur. 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

Response:

Our college campus, located in the rural region of Wandoor, spans 5 acres with a built-up area of 4688.17 sq. m. Nestled in the greenery of natural landscapes and free from industrial pollution, it enjoys the advantage of proximity to the Valancherry-Nilambur state highway. This serene environment is ideal for academic pursuits, supported by well-planned physical infrastructure.

The campus features 14 classrooms, a computer lab, a seminar hall, and a well-stocked library, offering an excellent learning environment. The infrastructure, developed with government and management support, has expanded since the college's inception in 2014-2015, when it offered four UG programs: B.Sc. Mathematics, BA English, BA Economics, and B.Com. with Co-operation. By 2021, the institution added its first PG program, MA in Development Economics, along with necessary infrastructure enhancements like the administrative section, IQAC room, and departmental offices.

Technology plays a key role in enhancing learning and administration on campus. The college provides 46 computers exclusively for students access, 39 in the computer lab and 7 in the resource center. In addition, all staff rooms, laboratories, and offices such as the examination office and IQAC are equipped with computers, high-speed printers, scanners, and access to a 400 MBPS high-speed internet connection. The Computer Science department boasts a well-equipped lab with 39 computers and an uninterrupted power supply supported by a generator, storage battery, and solar panel. The classrooms are spacious, ICT-enabled, and furnished with LCD projectors for enhanced teaching.

The library, a vital academic resource, caters to diverse needs with a reprographic center, barcode reader for book issuance, and a digital entry-exit system. It houses sections for new arrivals, magazines, references, competitive exams, and more. Additionally, 8 computers are available for digital resources, providing access to e-repositories like INFLIBNET, NLIST, DELNET, and NDLI. The library is also equipped with CCTV for security.

Extracurricular activities are well supported, with various clubs and forums designed to develop students' artistic and cultural talents. The annual arts festival provides a platform for students to showcase their skills, with opportunities to participate in competitions at the university, district, and state levels. Cultural event facilities include an open auditorium with a 400-seating capacity and a seminar hall measuring $12.8 \times 6 \text{ m}$.

Sports are an integral part of the college, with extensive facilities including badminton, volleyball, football courts, a fitness and yoga center, and a 200-meter track field. Students excelling in sports undergo rigorous selection and training, and they represent the college in intercollegiate and state-level competitions.

Ensuring student well-being, the campus offers amenities like a counseling center, separate toilet complexes for boys, girls, and differently-abled individuals, a girls' restroom, 24-hour water access, purified drinking water, and a first aid room. Additional facilities include staff and student parking areas, a green canopy maintained with gardens and plantations, and uninterrupted power through solar energy and generators. A digital display board at the main entrance highlights daily campus events, and a public addressing system and suggestion box facilitate open communication.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Library and Information Centre plays a key role in supporting the teaching and learning environment of the college. Spanning an area of 1,000 square feet, the library houses a collection of over 4,869 books, including 800 reference books, to meet diverse academic needs. Moreover, the library subscribes to 43 journals, providing students and faculty access to the latest research publications.

The college is registered under the NLIST program, granting access to an extensive digital repository comprising 31,64309 e-books and 6,000 e-journals through E-Shodh Sindhu. Students and staff can easily log in to the NLIST website to benefit from these invaluable resources, with login details shared during library orientation programs. Additionally, the college subscribes to the Developing Library Network (DELNET), providing access to over 40,000,000 books, 112,000+journal listings, 5,000+ full-text e-journals, and 145,000+ theses/dissertations.

The library has its own repository on DSpace, offering a variety of e-resources. It also provides access to the National Digital Library of India (NDLI), a digital repository containing textbooks, articles, videos, audiobooks, lectures, and simulations, all accessible through a single portal.

The Library and Information Centre uses the Library Management System KOHA, recognized as the world's best open-source library automation software. Through this system, the library efficiently manages tasks such as member circulation, cataloging, and report generation. The OPAC (Online Public Access Catalog) facility helps users find books by author, title, or accession number. The circulation counter assists with book lending activities, and barcode technology ensures the smooth management of book issuing, returning, renewal, and other operations. Additionally, the library features a digital entry-exit system.

The library and information centre offers several auxiliary facilities to enhance the overall learning experience of its users. The Resource Centre of the library, equipped with five computer systems and high-speed internet, serves as a hub for various academic activities, enabling students to work on projects, assignments, seminars, and competitive exam preparations. Reprographic and printing services are also available. The library provides ample seating capacity, facilitating group study and discussions.

The Reader's Club of the library organizes various programs to promote a reading- and researchoriented culture and to foster a love for literature and knowledge. These initiatives include day observations, book review programs, library orientation programs, essay writing competitions, quiz programs, and reading competitions.

The institution periodically augments and upgrades its IT infrastructure in line with technological advancements, successfully integrating IT into everyday activities. Regular college activities, such as teaching, learning, evaluation, and administrative processes, have become more efficient, transparent, and user-friendly through the effective application of information technology. The institution is committed to addressing network issues caused by its remote location.

The college uses the Embase Pro-suite for administrative and academic automation. In 2014, the college invested in and established a dedicated optical fiber connection from BSNL for high-speed internet access. Currently, the institution has three internet connections: the RAILWARE connection, installed in 2020, with a speed of 200 Mbps, and the K-FONE connection, installed in 2022, which is a free service provided by the Government of Kerala, with a speed of 100 Mbps. An uninterrupted power supply is ensured on campus through the use of a generator, storage battery, and solar panels. All departments, the library, and the office are connected to a LAN with 7 PT-Link N150 devices and a router. Although the campus Wi-Fi network was available earlier, an update was made in 2019 with the installation of higher-quality devices. These improvements have made accessing online materials easier, as all academic blocks are now connected to the Wi-Fi network.

All departmental staff rooms are equipped with laptops and desktops, which have internet access via both Wi-Fi and LAN ports. To facilitate ICT-enabled teaching, the institution provides LCD projectors in all classrooms. The resource center is equipped with facilities for internet browsing, printing, and photocopying, all of which are available to both faculty members and students. The resource center helps students access these services, including online registration for university examinations and employment opportunities.

The college has installed CCTVs in examination halls and selected areas to ensure security on campus. As part of the office's digitalization, most administrative processes are now integrated with IT. The college has a WIPRO server with 4GB RAM and a 1TB hard disk. Personal computers are provided for each clerk, typist, head accountant, and superintendent, all of which are networked and have high-speed internet connectivity. Additionally, a sufficient number of

printers, scanners, and copiers are available to ensure the smooth functioning of the administrative office.

'The Touch of Compassion'—The Community Upliftment Program

Objective:

Context:

Ambedkar College of Arts & Science (ACAS) in the Wandoor Constituency of Malappuram district plays a crucial role in providing higher education, especially for the Scheduled Caste (SC) community. As the only government-aided higher education institution in the area, ACAS is committed to social upliftment. Recognizing its social responsibility, the college governing body decided to extend its impact beyond the classroom to underserved tribal villages facing socioeconomic challenges, such as limited access to education and inadequate infrastructure. By adopting Chinkakallu as part of its community outreach program, ACAS aims to bridge the gap between the college and the local community.

The Practice:

• Food and Clothing Distribution by College Union (2019):

The college union organized a community outreach event where food and clothing were distributed to residents of Chinkakallu. This initiative provided immediate relief and support to families in need.
